AUDIT FINDING

Narrative:

The PREA audit of Centre Inc. Male and Female Units/ Fargo (Fargo Units) was conducted on August 10-12, 2016 by Andraska Consulting LLC / Dave Andraska, PREA certified auditor. Prior to the on-site audit, contact was made with the facility regarding logistics and checking on the posting of notices. The PREA Online Audit System (OAS) was used to complete the audit. The PREA Pre-Audit Questionnaire was completed on line by the PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations and supporting documents were uploaded in the OAS. The auditor reviewed and evaluated the information provided by the facility as well as the Centre Inc. website prior to the audit. The auditor utilized the online Auditor Compliance tool.

The audit began on Wednesday afternoon August 10, 2016 with an entry meeting with the Executive Director and his key staff. The staff introduced themselves and provides a brief overview of their areas of responsibilities. The auditor introduced himself and provided his background and discussed the audit process. A tour of both facilities was completed. All required facility staff and residents interviews were conducted on-site during the three day audit. On the first day of the audit there were 49 female residents and 88 male residents for a total of 137 residents. Fourteen (14) resident interviews were completed (10.2% of the 137 residents). The random interviewees were selected by the auditor from the housing rosters and designated lists of residents provided by the facility. A total of seventeen (17) staff was formally interviewed during the audit (21% of 80 staff). Staff was randomly selected from each of the three shift rosters and different departments within the facility. Additionally, specialized staff were interviewed including the Executive Director, PREA Coordinator, PREA Compliance Officer, Intermediate-Higher Level Staff, Staff Who Perform Screening, Incident Review Team, Staff Who Monitor Retaliation, Human Resources and Intake staff.

In addition to these formal interviews, many informal discussions were held with staff and residents which assisted in this PREA compliance audit. No residents contacted the auditor, prior or after the audit, or requested to meet with the auditor while on site.

There were three allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment reported in the past twelve months at the Fargo Units. A review of the investigations was conducted. One allegation was determined to be unfounded and two allegations were determined to be unsubstantiated.

An exit meeting was conducted by the auditor David Andraska at the completion of the on-site audit. While the auditor could not give the facility a final finding, the auditor did provide a preliminary status of their findings and indicated further documentation may be requested to demonstrate compliance. The auditor thanked the Director and facility for their hard work and commitment to the Prison Rape Elimination Act and indicated how impressed he was with the new facility.

Facility Characteristics:

Centre, Inc. is a North Dakota private non-profit rehabilitative, correctional and human service agency which was formed in 1976 to assist the courts and other mainstream public agencies in providing community-based services to establish halfway houses as a cost-effective intermediate sanction as well as an adjunct to parole or probation supervision. CENTRE: is an Acronym with the legal name being "Community Extended Nuclear Transitional Residence for Ex-offenders". Headquartered in Fargo, ND, Centre's programs and clients have greatly grown in numbers and its programming has evolved since its inception and currently has facilities in Fargo, Mandan and Grand Forks. The role of Centre, Inc. has been to provide for public safety by offering programs across the state which can effectively rehabilitate, supervise, and provide transitional housing to individuals in need of these services outside the institutions and jails/prisons.

A majority of Centre, Inc. programming has traditionally focused on treating criminogenic and/or other destructive behavior(s) with services tailored to their needs. Addiction programming/treatment is provided to those with substance dependence. Vocational counseling, job training and job placement are priority program objectives for all clients. The staff teaches accountability and personal responsibility to participants within structured programs. Good assessments, treatment planning, and counseling are the valued underpinning of the case management effort.

Centre, Inc. has agency wide policies and procedures that apply to all programs. Centre Inc. maintains a website at http://centreinc.org/ with a PREA section that lists reports, policies and relevant information. Centre, Inc. should be commended for their efforts to implement practices that show a commitment and understanding of the spirit and intent of the Prison Rape Elimination Act.

This PREA audit is for the Centre Inc. Male and Female Units Residential Program located in Fargo, ND. (Fargo Units). The residential housing units in Fargo are at two separate locations. The males are house at 123 15th Street N. which is an older two story concrete and stucco facility that prior to 2016 also housed female residents and Centre Inc. administrative offices. The capacity of the male unit is 106 residents. The females are housed at 3501 Westrac Drive which is a new building that opened in January 2016. Centre Inc. administrative offices are also located at this facility. The capacity of the female unit is 72. The program houses residents from the Federal Bureau of Prisons and the North Dakota Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and custody level includes Inmate, Parole, Probation and Pre-Trial. The residential facilities are staffed on a twenty-four hour a day basis. Although most residents are allowed to leave the facility for work and/or programming purposes, they must sign out and in with staff approval prior to leaving and upon return. Depending on varied referral source parameters and/or level/phase systems, residents may also sign out for other approved purposes.

The Centre Inc. Male and Female Units/Fargo, was assessed as "In Compliance" with the PREA standards in this Final Report. As listed above, of the 41 standards for Community Confinement Facilities, four (4) standards were assessed as substantially exceeding the requirements of the standard. Thirty Seven (37) standards were assessed as meeting substantial compliance in all material ways with the standard for the relevant review period. (Please note that, standards that did not apply such as 115.212 Contracting with Other Entities, where there are no contracts with other entities; 115.235 Specialized Training: Medical and Mental health care, no medical of mental health care staff employed or contracted; and standard 115.66 Preservation of Ability to Protect Inmates from Contact with Abusers, when there are no collective bargaining agreements; such standards were described as meeting the standard and were marked as "meet standards").

115.211 | Zero tolerance of sexual abuse and sexual harassment; PREA coordinator

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. written policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention mandates zero tolerance toward all forms of sexual abuse and sexual harassment and outlines the agency's approach to preventing, detecting, and responding to such conduct. This policy, on Centre Inc.'s website as well, is the basis for creating a zero tolerance culture in regards to all forms of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The Fargo Units appears to demonstrate a commitment to safety for residents and staff, while supporting a culture of prevention, detection, reporting, and response. Staff interviews revealed an ownership of the agency's commitment to the prevention, detection and response to sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and were well versed in this policy.

Centre Inc. employs an upper-level, agency-wide PREA Coordinator. The PREA Coordinator is based in Fargo, ND, and is proactive and committed to the implementation of all PREA standards. The PREA Coordinator is also the Director of Operations and supervises the PREA Compliance Officers at each site. The PREA Compliance Officer for the Fargo Units is also the Program Director. Interviews with the PREA Coordinator and PREA Compliance Officer revealed both acknowledging sufficient time and authority to develop, implement, and oversee efforts to comply with the PREA standards. The PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations and the PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director are evident on the agency's organizational chart, Centre, Inc. Policy #PE-1,

Through observation of bulletin boards, posters, handouts and materials, review of resident and staff handbooks, training curriculums and interviews with staff and residents it was apparent that the Fargo Units are committed to zero tolerance of sexual abuse and sexual harassment.

115.212 Contracting with other entities for the confinement of residents Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion Centre Inc. is not a public agency and does not contract for the confinement of its residents, therefore this standard in not applicable.

115.213 | Supervision and monitoring

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre, Inc. has developed a staffing plan for the Fargo Units that is based on the four criteria of this standard to include (1) The physical layout of each facility; (2) The composition of the resident population; (3) The prevalence of substantiated and unsubstantiated incidents of sexual abuse; and (4) Any other relevant factors. Based on the review of the staffing plan and interviews, the staffing plan was developed by the Executive Director with input from the PREA Coordinator and management staff. The facility does not deviate from the approved staffing plan. The staffing plan is reviewed annually and is supported by agency policy.

The Program Director, who directly supervises residential/direct care staff makes unannounced, sporadic checks throughout the facility. The Residential Specialist also makes random checks throughout the facility. Through reviews of housing area logs, and interviews with staff and inmates, it was confirmed that unannounced rounds are done randomly throughout the facility.

115.215 Limits to cross-gender viewing and searches

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. has a comprehensive written policy on searches (#P-17) and consistent practice of conducting no cross-gender strip, cross-gender visual body cavity searches, or cross-gender pat downs of residents which was confirmed through interviews with multiple residents, Residential Specialists, PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director and the Agency PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations. Pat searches are documented in resident logs in the SecurManage system.

Policy was supported by practice as confirmed in the aforementioned interviews, and noted during the PREA audit tour. Staffs of the opposite gender "announces" themselves by gender when conducting checks of sleeping rooms and bathroom/shower areas. Policies are in place and staff appears very respectful in carrying out procedures which enable residents to shower, perform bodily functions, and change clothing without staff of the opposite gender viewing their private areas of their bodies, except in exigent circumstances, or when such viewing is incidental to routine cell checks.

Training records were reviewed and confirmed all staff received a two hour training entitled, "Searches and Inspection", which also included notification and explanation of the updated procedure. The New Employee Orientation Checklist serves as documentation that each employee is trained on pat- down searches. Centre Inc. policy clearly states the facility will not search or physically examine a trans-gender or inter-sex resident for the sole purpose of determining the resident's genital status.

115.216 Residents with disabilities and residents who are limited English proficient

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention has established procedures to provide for residents that are limited English proficiency, residents with disabilities and residents with low literary levels equal opportunity to participate in and benefit from all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment.

The agency policy prohibits the use of inmate interpreters or other types of inmate assistants except in limited circumstances where there may be delay in obtaining an effective interpreter. This is evidenced by current policy and procedure. Interviews with the Agency PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations, PREA Compliance Officer, and intake staff confirmed there has been no need to use an interpreter over this past year due to an English speaking resident population. The facility staff is aware of community resources they can summon if the need for an interpreter were to arise. The Resident Specialist, who is conducting the intake, goes over information with the resident verbally and checks for understanding. The Residential Specialist will be able to provide immediate assistance to aid in the understanding of the written materials if a resident is in need because of a reading, comprehension, or hearing issue. The residents sign and date the document upon receipt, which indicates they understood the information presented. There were no limited English speaking residents placed at the facility during the time of the on-site audit visit.

115.217 Hiring and promotion decisions

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Per Centre Inc. Policy #PE-5 Personnel, it was determined that the agency has established a system of conducting criminal background checks for new employees and contractors who have contact with inmates to ensure they do not hire or promote anyone who may have contact with residents and does not enlist the services of any contractor who may have contact with residents who has engaged in sexual abuse in a prison, jail, lockup, community confinement facility, juvenile facility, or other institution, has been convicted of engaging or attempting to engage in sexual activity in the community facilitated by force, overt or implied threats of force, or coercion, or if the victim did not consent or was unable to consent or refuse or has been civilly or administratively adjudicated to have engaged in the activity described above. Centre Inc. considers any incidents of sexual harassment in determining whether to hire or promote anyone or to enlist the services of any contractor who may have contact with residents. Consistent with federal, state, and local law, Centre Inc. makes its best efforts to contact all prior institutional employers for information on substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or any resignation during a pending investigation of an allegation of sexual abuse. Centre Inc. asks all applicants and employees who may have contact with residents directly about previous misconduct described above in written applications or interviews for hiring or promotions and in any interviews or written self-evaluations conducted as part of reviews of current employees. Centre Inc. also imposes upon employees a continuing affirmative duty to disclose any such misconduct. Material omissions regarding such misconduct, or the provision of materially false information, are grounds for termination. Centre Inc. conducts criminal background records checks at least every five years of current employees and contractors who may have contact with residents.

Personnel files and forms were reviewed with the Human Resource Manager. Also through interviews with the Human Resource Manager, Superintendent, and PREA Coordinator it was determined that the agency policy and PREA standards were being followed concerning hiring, promotional decisions, and background checks.

115.218 Upgrades to facilities and technology

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. responded to a need for more beds and program space by opting to build a new building for female residents instead of expanding its existing Fargo facility that housed both male and female residents. In April of 2015 Centre broke ground on an expansion project that included constructing a 72 bed Residential Re-Entry Center for Adult Females on a lot located at 3501 Westrac Drive in Fargo, ND. The two story, approximately 19,000 square foot building would also be the home for Centre's administration/business offices. The new facility provides Centre with an additional 30 beds for females in the Fargo area and provides the ability to enhance their gender responsive approach and provide additional substance abuse treatment group opportunities. The facility is a state of the art, with excellent site lines and the newest technology HD cameras. The existing facility at 123 15th Street North is being renovated for male only residents. Centre demolished the 20 bed overflow unit/wing at this location as it was not easily monitored and had numerous blind spot and sleeping rooms had no access to natural light. New HD security cameras and overall floor plan design will strengthen both client and staff safety and security thus improving the program's ability to maintain fidelity to the Prison Rape Elimination Act standards. This renovation project will allow Centre Inc. to adhere to industry best practices. When completed, Centre will have substantially updated the current Fargo facilities and increased their residential/program capacity to serve an additional 42 individuals at any given time.

115.221 | Evidence protocol and forensic medical examinations

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention, directs that all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment be investigated and documented. The policy contains protocols for obtaining and preserving physical evidence. Interviews with the Agency PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations, and the PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director support practice as outlined in Centre Inc. Policy #P-18. The Facility ensures allegations of sexual abuse are referred for investigation to the Fargo Police Department unless the allegation does not involve potentially criminal behavior. If the allegation does not involve potentially criminal behavior, Centre Inc. will conduct an administrative investigation. The policy includes an overall description of the responsibilities and at what point a criminal investigation referral is made. A Memorandum of Understanding with the Fargo Police Department which indicates the Fargo Police Department utilizes protocol based on the Department of Justice's Office on Violence Against Women publication, "A National Protocol for Sexual Assault Medical Forensic Examinations, Adults/Adolescents" is also posted on Centre Inc's website.

Emergency medical healthcare along with forensic examinations by SANE/SAFE staff are provided at an outside facility, with no cost to the inmate. An advocate will be provided to the inmate upon request to provide emotional support through the forensic medical examination and investigation interviews. There were no forensic medical exams performed by SANE/SAFE staff during the last twelve months.

115.222 Policies to ensure referrals of allegations for investigations

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention, directs that all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment be investigated and documented. Interviews with the Agency PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations, and the PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director support practice as outlined in Centre Inc. Policy #P-18. The Facility ensures allegations of sexual abuse are referred for investigation to the Fargo Police Department unless the allegation does not involve potentially criminal behavior. The policy includes an overall description of the responsibilities and at what point a criminal investigation referral is made. A Memorandum of Understanding with the Fargo Police Department which indicates the Fargo Police Department utilizes protocol based on the Department of Justice's Office on Violence Against Women publication, "A National Protocol for Sexual Assault Medical Forensic Examinations, Adults/Adolescents" is also posted on Centre Inc's website.

115.231 | Employee training

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. trains all employees who have contact with residents on: It's zero tolerance policy for sexual abuse and sexual harassment: how to fulfill their responsibilities under agency sexual abuse and sexual harassment prevention, detection, reporting, and response policies and procedures, residents' right to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment, the right of residents and employees to be free from retaliation for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment, the dynamics of sexual abuse and sexual harassment in confinement, the common reactions of sexual abuse and sexual harassment victims, how to detect and respond to signs of threatened and actual sexual abuse, how to avoid inappropriate relationships with residents, how to communicate effectively and professionally with residents, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender nonconforming residents, and how to comply with relevant laws related to mandatory reporting of sexual abuse to outside authorities. All the current employees at the Fargo Units have received training regarding PREA standards and each employee is provided with refresher training annually to ensure that all employees know the agency's current sexual abuse and sexual harassment policies and procedures. In addition to the annual PREA refresher training, the agency clearly provides refresher information on current sexual abuse and sexual harassment policies. The Fargo Units staff was able to articulate required PREA training components and offer examples of day to day implementation during multiple interviews. A review of training records was completed as part of the audit process. Documentation of staff participating and understanding the training is maintained.

Centre Inc. also provides a written guide called "Centre Inc. Coordinated Response to PREA Incidents" uses shading, design, bulleting and categories of action which are clearly identified by the various disciplines which include staff. The diagram is in the shape of an arrow, implying guided direction throughout the coordinated response, beginning with the first responder, and ending with a formal review of the sexual abuse incident. These diagrams are posted throughout the facility and serve as quick reference guides to staff, and a reminder to staff and residents of Centre Inc.

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention, address the requirements of the standard. All current volunteers and contractors have been trained in PREA standards based on the services they provide and level of contact they have with residents. All volunteers and contractors who have contact with residents are notified of the agency's zero tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment and informed how to report such incidents. The Fargo Units maintains Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) Compliance Acknowledgment (Contractors, Vendors and Volunteers) forms signed by volunteers and contractors indicating they understand and will comply with the agreement. The auditor reviewed Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) Compliance Acknowledgment (Contractors, Vendors and Volunteers) forms signed by volunteers and contractors. A contractor was interviewed and was able to articulate his knowledge of PREA, his

responsibilities, and the agency's zero tolerance policy.

115.233 Resident education

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. provides a comprehensive inmate PREA education to the resident population beginning at intake into the agency. During the Fargo Units intake process, residents receive "Centre -An Overview for Clients on Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention" which is comprehensive information explaining the agency's zero tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment, how to report incidents or suspicions of sexual abuse or sexual harassment, their rights to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment and to be free from retaliation for reporting such incidents, and regarding agency policies and procedures for responding to such incidents. All residents sign, date, and acknowledge understanding on the "An Overview for Clients on Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention Signature Acknowledgment Page". Many of these resident signature acknowledgment pages were reviewed during the on-site visit, as the document becomes part of the electronic resident file. The inmate handbook also explains the agency's zero tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment and how to report incidents.

Centre Inc. policies, and interviews with intake staff, Residential Specialists, Case Managers, and residents confirm the provision of resident education in formats accessible to all residents, including those who are limited English proficient, deaf, visually impaired, or otherwise disabled as well as residents who have limited reading skills. Within 48 hours of arrival, residents participate in a PREA orientation group, which utilizes the Just Detention International DVD entitled, "PREA: What You Need to Know". Participation in PREA orientation group was supported by interviews with residents. The PREA orientation groups exceed PREA Community Confinement standards, which require PREA education be provided at time of intake. The Fargo Units ensures key information is continuously and readily available or visible to residents through other written information. Bright lime green PREA posters that are 16" x 20" containing bold black font are posted throughout the facility in clearly visible locations.

This is an intensive, comprehensive, specialized training for PREA investigators and includes techniques for interviewing sexual abuse victims, proper use of Miranda and Garrity warnings, sexual abuse evidence collection in confinement settings, and the criteria and evidence required to substantiate a case for administrative action or prosecution referral. They also completed a 16 hour PREA Investigation training from the North Dakota Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation as well as numerous online PREA Training through the National Institute of Corrections and Relias Learning. Interview of the Agency PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations indicates a commitment to the prevention, detection and coordinated response to sexual abuse.

115.241 | Screening for risk of victimization and abusiveness

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre, Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention, address the assessment process and the use of the screening information to determine bed assignment with the goal of keeping inmates at high risk of being sexually victimized from those at high risk of being sexually abusive. Intake screening ordinarily takes place within 48 hours of arriving at the facility. If an inmate screens for high risk of sexual victimization or high risk of being sexually abusive, a referral will be made to the Program Director, and/or Director of Operations. The current intake screening considers nine criteria to assess residents for risk of sexual victimization. In addition the intake screening considers prior acts of sexual abuse, prior convictions for violent offenses, and history of prior institutional violence or sexual abuse, as known to the facility in assessing residents for risk of being sexually abusive. The resident is asked during the screening and reassessment process "Do you perceive yourself as potentially vulnerable to victimization?" As part of the inmate's initial medical screening, health service staff also asks questions regarding sexual abuse and safety. This affords the resident another opportunity to report or disclose any concerns regarding victimization and abusiveness

The PREA Initial Assessment, a comprehensive, objective screening tool was created using a revised version of the ND Department of Correction and Rehabilitation's screening tool. This objective screening tool is scored utilizing a scoring manual, entitled, the PREA Rating Assessment Manual, and will promote scoring consistency across ND facilities. Case Managers will be reminded, via a task due in the Case Management tab of SecurManage, within 25 days of the client's entry to complete the PREA Risk Re-assessment. The creation of this objective screening tool, creating parallel policy and procedures, which included the process of reassessing all clients within 30 days of the client's arrival at the facility.

The housing and program assignments are made on a case by case basis based on information obtained during the screening interview. The housing and program assignments may be changed after the inmate is further evaluated by the appropriate staff. Through resident ,in-take staff and case managers interviews, it was determined that the facility addresses the needs of the resident consistent with the security and safety of the individual inmate.

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention, address the assessment process and the use of the screening information. The facility uses information from the risk screening required by §115.241 to make informed housing, bed, work, education, and program assignments with the goal of keeping separate those residents at high risk of being sexually victimized from those at high risk of being sexually abusive. In a highly respectful manner, evidenced by intake staff, Case Managers and Residential Specialist interviews, the facility focuses on individualizing these determinations. As demonstrated through policy and documentation of such team housing decisions, based on factors of vulnerability and propensity for aggression, the facility considers on a case-by- case basis whether a placement would ensure the resident's health and safety, and whether the

placement would present management or security problems

115.251	Resident reporting

	Centre Inc. established procedures allowing for multiple internal and external ways for inmates to report sexual abuse, sexual harassment, and retaliation. PREA reporting methods are shared with inmates at intake, during orientation, and on posters throughout the facility. Inmates are informed they can report verbally and in writing to staff, contact the PREA Coordinator, report to an outside agency, the North Dakota Department of Corrections or contact the Bureau of Prisons. Inmates may also report allegations through third party reporting or send an anonymous note. These reporting systems were demonstrated through review of policies and procedures, inmate handbook, posters throughout the facility, and interviews with inmates and staff.
	During the resident interviews, residents indicated they felt comfortable reporting sexual abuse or sexual harassment and they know the options available to them for reporting. Staff indicated through interviews they were aware of the methods available to them to report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of inmates.

115.252 Exhaustion of administrative remedies

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy #P-6 Grievance/Administrative Remedy is a comprehensive administrative procedure for dealing with resident grievances regarding sexual abuse. Within this administrative procedure the following is outlined: A resident may submit a grievance regarding an allegation of sexual abuse at any time regardless of when the incident is alleged to have occurred. In an attempt to reach resolution, the facility will not require a resident to use any informal grievance process, or to otherwise attempt to resolve with staff an alleged incident of sexual abuse. Further, nothing in this section shall restrict the facility's ability to defend against a lawsuit filed by a resident on the ground that the applicable statute of limitations has expired. In addition, Centre Inc. ensures a resident who alleges sexual abuse may submit a grievance without submitting it to a staff member who is the subject of the complaint, and the grievance is not referred to a staff member who is the subject of the complaint. Centre Inc. allows third parties including fellow residents, staff members, family members, attorneys, and outside advocates to assist residents in filing requests for administrative remedies relating to allegations of sexual abuse and permit filing such requests on behalf of residents. If the resident declines to have the request processed on his or her behalf, the facility shall document the resident's decision. There were no grievances alleging sexual abuse this past year in which the residents declined third-party assistance.

115.253	Resident access to outside confidential support services

	The Fargo Units provides addresses and phone numbers of local, state and national sexual assault hotlines in distributed written materials and on PREA posters. There are accessible pay phones in the facilities and residents may use a staff phone if indigent. Residents with hearing and/or speech disabilities shall be afforded access to a Telecommunications Device for the Deaf (TDD) or comparable equipment. Residents are not allowed to use their cell phones within the facility however, a large percentage of residents access their cell phones and community phones when outside of the facility. Interviews with the Case Manager, the Agency PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director, and residents support upon intake Centre Inc. provides residents An Overview for "Clients on Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention". Within this document are resources for confidential support services. Intake staff, who are usually the Residential Support Staff or Case Managers, check for understanding and guide the resident through the written material. A very lengthy list of other community-based resources available for support and therapy is also provided. Centre Inc. has entered into an MOU with a Fargo based crisis center to provide services The facility informs residents at time of intake the extent to which such communications will be monitored
	and the extent to which reports of abuse will be forwarded to authorities in accordance with mandatory reporting laws. Resident interviews revealed knowledge of the ability to make a report confidentially to local, state and national sexual abuse and domestic violence hotlines.

115.254	Third party reporting

	Centre Inc. trains staff to accept, document, and immediately refer third-party reports. Upon intake, residents receive information about third-party reporting in the comprehensive document entitled, An Overview for "Clients on Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention". PREA posters also support the process of third-party reporting, and the facility has posted methods and encouragement regarding third-party reporting relative to public access on Centre Inc.'s website. Observations during the tour of the facility found printed information and material strategically posted in the facility

115.261 | Staff and agency reporting duties

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention require that all staff to report immediately any knowledge, suspicion, or information regarding an incident of sexual abuse or sexual harassment that occurred in a facility, whether or not it is part of the agency; retaliation against residents or staff who reported such an incident, and any staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to an incident or retaliation. It also states that staff is not to reveal any information related to a sexual abuse report to anyone other than extent necessary, as specified in agency policy, to make treatment, investigation, and other security and management decisions.

The specialized and random staff interviews confirm that staff are knowledgeable in their reporting duties, the process of reporting, and to whom to report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of inmates, including third-party and anonymous reports. Staff training and daily practice support the expectation staff will not reveal any information related to a sexual abuse report to anyone other than to the extent necessary, as specified in facility policy, to make treatment, investigation, and other security and management decisions. The Fargo Units refers residents to community medical and mental health providers. The PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director was aware of the mandatory reporting laws regarding if the alleged victim is considered a vulnerable adult under North Dakota State statute, which mandates the agency reporting the allegation to the designated State or local social services agency. Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention directs that all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment be referred for investigation including third party and anonymous reports.

115.262 Agency protection duties

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention requires staff to take immediate action to protect any inmate subject to substantial risk of sexual abuse. The policy outline the immediate action that is to be taken to protect inmates who are in substantial risk of sexual abuse by removing the inmate immediately from the area to a safe location.. All staff interviewed knew the steps to take to protect an inmate at risk for sexual abuse. Line and supervisory staff work simultaneous to take protective measures as information is reported. In the past twelve months, no inmate reported feeling at imminent risk of sexual abuse or any staff reported that an inmate was subject to substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse, therefore, there were no protective measures to implement.

115.263	Reporting to other confinement facilities

	Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention address this standard. Upon receiving an allegation that a resident was sexually abused while confined at another facility, the PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director receiving the allegation, shall notify the head of the facility or appropriate office of the agency where the alleged abuse occurred, as soon as possible, but no later than 72 hours after receiving the allegation documenting the notification. Interviews with the Agency PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations, and PREA Compliance Officer/ Program Director indicated the Fargo Units has not received notifications regarding allegations made by former residents. Policy and protocol ensure such allegations would be investigated in accordance with these standards.

115.264	Staff first responder duties

	Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention includes a comprehensive "first responder duties" section that addresses this standard. Coordinated Response to PREA Incidents" which originates with the specific duties of a first responder is posted throughout the facility and on Centre Inc.'s website. Confirmed by staff interviews, first responders were able to verbalize the required action and step required after learning of an allegation a resident was sexually abused. An interview of a non-direct care staff indicated a clear understanding if the first staff responder is not a security staff member; the responder shall be required to request that the alleged victim not take any actions that could destroy physical evidence, and then notify Residential/Direct Care staff. There have been no incidents requiring "first response" by any staff, or allegations of resident sexual abuse at the Fargo Units in the last 12 months.

	Centre Inc. has developed a written and visual institutional plan to coordinate actions taken in response to an incident of sexual abuse among staff first responders, medical and mental health practitioners, investigators, and facility leadership. This written plan, entitled, "Centre Inc. Coordinated Response to PREA Incidents" uses shading, design, bulleting and categories of action which are clearly identified by the various disciplines which include staff. The diagram is in the shape of an arrow, implying guided direction throughout the coordinated response, beginning with the first responder, and ending with a formal review of the sexual abuse incident. These diagrams are posted throughout the Fargo Units and serve as quick reference guides to staff, and a reminder to staff and residents of Centre Inc. commitment to prevention, detection, and effective response to sexual abuse within confinement. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention and #PE-44 Whistleblower Protection establish a practice to protect inmates and staff who report sexual abuse or sexual harassment or cooperates with sexual abuse or sexual harassment investigations, and from retaliation by staff or inmates. A designated staff member at the facility is responsible for monitoring for retaliation. The monitoring will include any disciplinary reports, housing, or any negative performance reviews or reassignments of staff. The monitoring shall include periodic in-person status checks every thirty days. There is a ninety (90) day monitoring time period for retaliation review, however the time frame can be extended if warranted. This standard is met as demonstrated in policy and verified in interviews with the Agency PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations and PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director.

115.271 Criminal and administrative agency investigations

Auditor Discussion

The PREA Standard is met through Centre Inc. Policies #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention and # Policy #SP-6, Information Practices, Confidentiality, Records and Data; Statistics, Outcome Measures and Agency Cooperation. Centre Inc. conducts only administrative investigations. The PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations and the PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director, who have been trained through Specialized Investigator training, conduct the administrative investigations. If an allegation appears to be at all criminal in nature, an immediate referral is made to the Fargo Police Department for investigation The PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director of Centre Inc. is committed to act as a liaison, and makes efforts to remain informed of progress regarding the investigation. Centre Inc. follows a uniform evidence protocol to investigate sexual abuse and sexual harassment, sexual investigations are conducted promptly, early, and objectively including third party and anonymous reports, and the use of investigators who have been specially trained in sexual abuse investigations. Based on the review of the investigations, the agency's policies, and interviews with facility staff and investigators, it was determined investigations into allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment are done promptly, thoroughly and objectively for all allegations. The credibility of an alleged victim, suspect, or witness is assessed on an individual basis and not determined by the person's status as an inmate or staff. Neither the agency nor Fargo Police require an inmate who alleges sexual abuse to submit to a polygraph examination or other truth-telling device as a condition for proceeding with the investigation of such an allegation. Investigators complete a written report with investigation findings that contains a thorough description of physical, testimonial, and documentary evidence.

There were no substantiated allegations of sexual abuse that were referred for prosecution in the past twelve months. The Investigation files reviewed were properly documented and organized. Documentation which supports the agency retention of all written reports pertaining to the administrative or criminal investigation (if provided criminal investigative reports) for as long as the alleged abuser is incarcerated or employed by the agency, plus five years, was reviewed.

115.272 Evidentiary standard for administrative investigations

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. imposes a standard of preponderance of the evidence for determining whether or not allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment are substantiated. Interviews with the PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations and PREA Compliance Officer, (who are also Investigative Staff), confirm compliance with the standard.

115.273 Reporting to residents

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention require that all residents who make allegations of sexual abuse shall be informed of the investigation outcome whether the finding was substantiated, unsubstantiated, or unfounded. The process directs the agency notify the resident the outcome of the investigation when it is determined to be substantiated or unsubstantiated. The notification is documented in investigative file with date of notification. If the case is determined unfounded, the resident will be notified by the facility. Documentation of unfounded notifications is the written response to the resident.

If the allegation was sexual abuse by a staff member, the policy requires the resident be informed of the status of the staff member in writing to include whether the staff member is no longer posted within the resident's unit, the staff member is no longer employed at the facility, the agency's learns that the staff member has been indicated on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility, and/or the agency learns the staff member has been convicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility. If the allegation was sexual abuse by another resident, the facility informs the resident whether the alleged abuser has been indicated on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility and/or convicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility.

Interviews of the PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations and PREA Compliance Officer (who are also Investigative Staff) confirm compliance with the policy. A review of the investigative file indicate the residents are informed of the outcome.

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion Centre Inc. has a comprehensive policy, and professional expectations of staff as outlined in policy P-18 and Centre Inc.'s Personnel Policies and Procedures manual. Staff shall be subject to disciplinary sanctions up to and including termination for violating agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies; termination shall be the presumptive disciplinary sanction for staff who has engaged in sexual abuse. All terminations for violations of agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies, or resignations by staff who would have been terminated if not for their resignation, will be reported to law enforcement agencies, unless the activity was clearly not criminal, and to relevant licensing bodies. These policies also provide disciplinary sanctions for violations of the agency's policies relating to sexual abuse or sexual harassment commensurate with the nature and circumstances of the acts committed, the staff member's disciplinary history, and the sanctions imposed for comparable offenses by other staff with

similar histories. In the past twelve months, there have been no terminations or discipline

imposed on any staff member for sexual abuse or sexual harassment.

115.277 Corrective action for contractors and volunteers Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard **Auditor Discussion** Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention, states any contractor or volunteer who engages in sexual abuse shall be prohibited from contact with residents and shall be reported to law enforcement agencies, unless the activity was clearly not criminal, as well as to relevant licensing bodies. There are no volunteers at Grand Forks Transition, and no contractors have been reported to law enforcement for engaging in sexual abuse of residents. They are also prohibited from further contact with inmates. Interviews with contractors confirmed they were aware of the policies and remedial measures taken for engaging in sexual abuse or sexual harassment of inmates. The Executive Director stated during the interview that the volunteer/contractor would be suspended from entering the facility during the investigation. If the sexual abuse case is substantiated, the volunteer/contractor would be prohibited from entering an agency facility and may be turned over for prosecution if warranted. In the past twelve months, there have been no contractors or volunteers suspended or reported to law enforcement for engaging in sexual abuse of inmates.

115.278 Disciplinary sanctions for residents

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy #P-13 Program Rules and Discipline, states residents shall be subject to disciplinary sanctions pursuant to a formal disciplinary process following an administrative finding that the resident engaged in resident-on-resident sexual abuse or following a criminal finding of guilt for resident-on-resident sexual abuse. Centre Residential Service Contract signed by the resident also reiterates these issues. Sanctions shall be commensurate with the nature and circumstances of the abuse committed, the resident's disciplinary history, and the sanctions imposed for comparable offenses by other residents with similar histories. Disciplinary process shall consider whether a resident's mental disabilities or mental illness contributed to his or her behavior when determining what type of sanction, if any, should be imposed. Referrals may be made for community-based therapy, counseling, or other interventions designed to address and correct underlying reasons or motivations for the abuse. The facility shall consider whether to require the offending resident to participate in such interventions as a condition of access to programming or other benefits. Centre Inc. prohibits all sexual activity between residents and may discipline residents for such activity. The facility however, deems such activity to constitute sexual abuse only if it determines that the activity is coerced.

Interviews with the PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations and PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director clearly represent a philosophy of positive reinforcement and redirection, as well as the use of cognitive restructuring and creative interventions to support resident success.

115.282	Access to emergency medical and mental health services
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention state that resident victims of sexual abuse receive timely, unimpeded access to emergency medical treatment and mental health care at no cost to the resident. The Fargo units do not employ medical and/or mental health staff. Security staff first responders will take preliminary steps to protect the victim pursuant to §115.262, and shall immediately notify the appropriate medical and mental health practitioners, according to outlined coordinated response. Residents in need of emergency and/or SANE/SAFE services are transported to an outside hospital. Forensic examinations shall be performed by Sexual Assault Forensic Examiners (S.A.F.E.) or Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (S.A.N.E.). It also indicates resident victims of sexual abuse while incarcerated shall be offered timely information about, and timely access to, emergency contraception and sexually transmitted infections and prophylaxis at no cost to the victim. Interviews with Residential Specialist/First Responders, PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director and PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director support current policy and procedure. There were no residents who reported sexual abuse at the time of the on-site

audit.

115.283	Ongoing medical and mental health care for sexual abuse victims and abusers

	Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention, address the requirements of the standard. The services and treatment is at no cost to the inmates and are consistent with the community level of care. Per policy, inmate victims of sexual abuse while incarcerated are offered pregnancy tests and tests for sexually transmitted infections as medically appropriate.

Secondary documentation regarding referrals, timeliness of referrals and provision of services is the responsibility of the case managers overseen by the PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director There were no confirmed victims or inmate abuser in the last twelve months.

115.286 | Sexual abuse incident reviews

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Centre Inc. Policy #SP-9 Reporting and Handling of Significant Incidents, (including Critical Incidents) directs that a sexual abuse incident review is conducted at the conclusion of every sexual abuse or harassment investigation, using the form entitled "Sexual Abuse Response Team (SART) Report". The review occurs well within 30 days of the conclusion of the investigation. The Director of Operations will assign staff members to a Sexual Abuse Response Team (SART) for each incident involving potential sexual abuse and or harassment. Incidents involving possible employee standard of conduct violations (including volunteers and contractors) will have administrators and the employee's or department's manager assigned to the SART. Incidents involving residents without staff, volunteers and contractors will consist of assigned clinical staff, Residential Specialist II and managers/directors. The SART will complete a Sexual Abuse Response Team Report for each incident. The SART Report assesses for required aspects as outlined in PREA Standard 115.286. The SART team reviews the circumstances of the incident; the name(s) of the person(s) involved; a consideration of whether the actions taken were consistent with agency policies and procedures; consider whether the allegation or investigation indicates a need to change policy or practice to better detect, or respond to sexual abuse; consider whether the incident or allegation was motivated by race, ethnicity, gender identity, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex identification, status, or perceived status, gang affliction, or was motivated or otherwise caused by other group dynamics at the facility; an examination of the area in the facility where the incident alleged occurred to assess whether physical barriers in the area may enable abuse; an assessment of the adequacy of staffing levels in that area during different shifts; and an assessment as to whether monitoring technology should be deployed or augmented to supplement supervision by staff.

Interviews with the PREA Coordinator/Director of Operations and the PREA Compliance Officer/Program Director revealed the aforementioned are always involved in the sexual abuse incident review, as well as the staff involved in the current incident. The facility shall implement recommendations that result from the review, or document the reasons for not doing so. In the past twelve months, there were three administrative investigations of alleged sexual abuse completed at the Fargo Units. On allegation was determined to be unfounded and two were determined to be unsubstantiated.

115.287	Data collection

	Centre Inc. Policy #P-18 Sexual Abuse/Assault Prevention and Intervention, address the requirements of the standard. The Fargo Units collects data for every allegation of sexual abuse, which at a minimum includes, the data necessary to answer all questions from the most recent version of the Survey of Sexual Violence conducted by the Department of Justice. This data is aggregated annually. In addition, the Fargo Units maintains, reviews, and collects data as needed from all available incident-based documents including reports, investigation files, and sexual abuse incident reviews. Centre Inc. Policy #P-9 Reporting and Handling of Significant or Unusual Incidents, (including Critical Incidents) states, The Director of Operations will assign staff members to a Sexual Abuse Response Team (SART) for each incident involving potential sexual abuse and or harassment.
